

## NNCO scheme details:

- Explicitly aims to encourage more young people into Higher Education
- Nationally coordinated approach to work with schools, colleges and HEIs
- Scheme involves around 4,300 secondary schools and 200 universities and colleges
- 33 local and 3 national networks to support SPoCs
- HEFCE funding £22m for 2 years















## Three strand project partnership (Developing the Map)

- Reaching Wider East: UCL & UEL
- Reaching Wider London: University of Greenwich & UEL
- Reaching Wider creative industries: Ravensbourne & UEL
  - Suite of three research projects examining the outreach offer taken up by schools and colleges in East London (and eastward from London), pan-London, and a smaller bespoke piece of research examining creative industry subject area outreach












## Hot and Cold HE participation spots

## What Works

- Early intervention
- Sustained interventions like summer schools
- Whole year groups (to avoid self selection of learners who are already going to HE)
- HEIs going into schools
- Subject based taster sessions






## Case study 2:

## City and University cooperation- The HE journey of young London residents (18-24 yrs)

- Project Partners:

  - London Borough of Newham
  - London Councils (33 boroughs)
  - Malmo University/ City
- Project background and collaboration:
  - Pilot project between LBN and UEL
  - 2012 Initial data report
  - 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016 and
     2017 Pan-London report
  - 2018 report to be launched in December













## London Context



**Local government** - 33 local authorities (local planning, housing, waste collection, council tax collection, education, libraries, social services, local planning, consumer protection, licensing, cemeteries)

- Population of 8.3 million
- Total area of 611 square miles
- Largest number of community languages spoken in Europe
- Over 300 languages spoken in London schools
- One of the world's most ethnically diverse cities
- More than 3,000 schools, 42 colleges and 47 universities
- Generates more than a fifth of the total UK economy












## London Borough of Newham Overview



- Large local authority in east London with a population of over 318,000
- 3<sup>rd</sup> most deprived local authority in England (IMD)
- Highest birth rate in the UK & youngest population in the UK
- This impacts on education system and future education planning
- Most ethnically diverse population in the UK (36 % Asian, 35 % White, 25 % Black or Black British)
- High percentage of residents with no or low-level qualifications
- Highest unemployment in London (10.8 %), London (7.1 %), UK (6.5 %), and high youth unemployment.
- 11,700 people unemployed













## Project background and collaboration (City wide analysis)

- Good local research undertaken by Newham and the University of East London showed a potential way forward (London Councils)
- A partnership approach- offering the 'scale' of London provided researchers with:
  - The opportunity to work on city- wide analysis
  - Sufficient scale to deliver robust information from the HESA Student Return and the Destination of Leavers from HE Survey













## Project outputs and outcomes (Developing understanding)

- Detailed data report with policy commentary and borough level summaries
- Report based on HESA student returns and Destination of leavers from HE survey
- Time series analysis with six year trend
- LBN investment in 6th Form provision for STEM to enhance HE progression – opened in September 2014 based on trend data from 2012 report













## Dissemination and project impact (Making a difference)

- Political briefing based on the data report was sent out to 1,861 elected local councillors – Does Higher Education investment pay off for young Londoners?
- Briefing paper to all London MPs
- Launch event December 2013 at UEL attended by 50 plus professionals from local authorities, further and higher education as well as schools and employers
- Follow-up report on the impact of increased tuition fees on HE participation launched at UEL in July 2014
- Presentation at Action on Access-UUK-OFFA-HEFCE summit
- Presentations at borough 14-19 groups across London
- Most recent report being used by London Enterprise Panel to inform thinking about European Social Investment Fund programmes
- Improving quality of key decisions across the boroughs
